How It All Began

Loyola Rugby technically began in the fall of 1976 when a Jesuit priest, Father Lipinski, tried to put together a team that September. There were several practices with only a handful of guys showing up each time. I watched the last practice and was fascinated by the game. In February of '77, after talking to several students with rugby experience — namely Mike Homa and Matt Lehr — I decided to plaster Loyola with flyers to see what kind of interest we could generate.

We had about fifteen guys at each practice. After three or four weeks, we decided we were ready for a match. Loyola Rugby's first match was that spring against the Baltimore Rugby Club. We were hoping for a good outing along with an educational experience. We played a much larger and more experienced A side and got our butts kicked. It was a demoralizing loss and the team fell apart. That was the only game we had in the spring of '77.

Ed Yeagla and I decided to play for Baltimore the rest of that season, which was beneficial because we learned a lot. In the fall of '77, we jump-started the team again. We were

able to get a guy from Chesapeake to help out occasionally in exchange for sneaking him into the cafeteria after practice. Mike Homa and I coached by committee due to the lack of outside help. We played several matches against local C sides, and after each match opposing players, coaches and referees would provide guidance and encourage us to keep it going. We actually won a couple of games at the end of that fall.

We played in assorted motley rugby jerseys and decided in October of '77 to drive to a supplier in Virginia to buy team jerseys. We bought a maroon, white and blue set at a cheap price because they had been ordered for a team that went defunct and the supplier was stuck with them.

In the spring of '78 we started playing college sides. Loyola's first significant victory was against the Naval Academy B side that season. We also played in the Preakness Tournament and won two games. I believe our record was 5–3 that spring. The team almost folded again when we lost all of the team's rugby balls. The team had no money and no rugby balls. They were never found. So we scrounged some more money together, made another road trip, and bought some more.

We first played in the Mount Cup in the spring of '79 and then played in the Preakness Tourney again, but lost the second game to Salisbury. Loyola Rugby had a good season in the fall of 1979. We beat Rock City (the morning after the Rugby House Halloween party), Towson and American University. The most notable event that season was Tom McKean tackling the Rock City kicker as he was about to kick off to start the match. The referee was so shocked and could not stop laughing that he decided to just start over.

In the fall of 1979, Kenny Ames was able to recruit our first coach, Loc Vetter. Loc had played at UCLA and was in Baltimore for his orthopedic residency at Johns Hopkins. He brought a wealth of rugby knowledge and a passion for the game. He quickly turned Loyola Rugby into a cohesive team and a local powerhouse.

Loyola's record in the spring of 1980 was 14–2–1, including wins over Towson, Navy, UNC, American University, Washington Irish and Catholic University in eight inches of snow. We also won the Mount Cup and the Preakness Tournament.

There were a lot of noteworthy events during those early years. Loyola's first home game was on Parents' Weekend in October of 1978, with the party to follow at McAuley apartments. After

that, many of us were strongly encouraged to move off campus — and the Rugby House was born. Vic Norris organized a tour to Florida in the spring of 1980 where we went 2–1 and had twenty-five guys staying in two rooms. The club founded the Jesuit Invitational Tournament in 1982, which ran for ten years and became the number one event on campus.

Since those early days, Loyola Rugby has notched many tournament wins and regional championships, toured internationally, and competed at the highest levels of national competition. During the late '80s, the club was ranked in the top ten in the entire country, losing in the E.R.U. Finals. Over the past several years, the club has won two Mid-South Championships and took second place at the 2019 National CRC 7s Championships. The team finished the 2019 15s season ranked first in the country and has remained in the top ten each season since — in both 15s and 7s. The club has also produced a large number of select-side players, All-Americans and stand-outs competing for D1 men's clubs. Our alumni group, SLOB, is now awarding scholarships and supporting the program in so many ways.

None of us in those early days could have imagined the incredible success that Loyola Rugby would achieve.

LOUIS CARRICO '80

Fifty Years, In Brief

1976

A Jesuit priest, Father Lipinski, calls the first practices at Loyola. A handful of men turn up.

1977

Louis Carrico '80 papers the campus with flyers. Loyola's first match — against the Baltimore Rugby Club — ends in a rout, and the side folds. It is rebuilt that fall and wins its first games.

1978

First college opposition, and a first significant win over the Naval Academy B side. The first home match is played on Parents' Weekend that October. The Rugby House is born.

1979

First Mount Cup in the spring. That fall, wins over Rock City, Towson and American — and Kenny Ames recruits Dr. Loc Vetter as Loyola's first coach.

1980

Under Vetter the club goes 14–2–1 in the spring, winning both the Mount Cup and the Preakness Tournament. Vic Norris organizes a tour to Florida.

1982

The club founds the Jesuit Invitational Tournament. It runs for ten years and becomes the biggest event on campus.

1984

An undefeated season.

1988–90

Three straight PRU championships. East Coast runners-up in 1988 and a national Elite Eight run, losing to Dartmouth; in 1990 the East Coast Final Four and the national Sweet Sixteen, losing to Army.

2001

Sean Lugano '95, a three-time All-American and former captain, is killed on September 11 when Flight 175 strikes the South Tower of the World Trade Center.

2010

The Lugano family gives \$1 million to build Sean Lugano Field, a regulation pitch in honour of the 1995 graduate. Loyola Rugby has a home of its own.

2013

The Society of Loyola Old Boys is founded as a 501(c)(3) to support the program permanently.

2015–19

Four consecutive NSCRO national tournaments — the Elite Eight in 2015–16 and 2016–17, the Final Four in 2017–18, the Sweet Sixteen in 2018–19.

2016

PRC champions. The 40th Anniversary Gala inaugurates the Loyola Rugby Hall of Fame.

2018

Kyle Higgins '19 is named an All-American — the club's first since Sean Lugano '95.

2019

Second place at the National CRC 7s Championships under new 7s coach Will Knipscher. The 15s side finishes the season ranked first in the country under head coach Matt Cipriano. Women's rugby is resurrected at Loyola, with Kathleen Malcotti taking charge of the program.

2020

Danny Giannascoli '19, a four-time Loc Vetter MVP, becomes the first small-college player drafted by Major League Rugby.

2022

The 45th Anniversary Gala inducts the second Hall of Fame class.

2026

Fifty years. Two Mid-South Championships in recent seasons, a decade inside the national top ten, an endowed scholarship, and a third Hall of Fame class.

Derald Dudley

HEAD COACH '06–'11

COACH

Derald led the program for six seasons alongside Matt Keffer, always putting player health and brotherhood first while steadily professionalizing the club — merit-based selection, midweek practices, a fitness coach, and the club retreat.

- Head Coach 2006–2011; instilled the standard of exceptional fitness that remains a club expectation today
- Added Wednesday practices, Friday walk-throughs, merit-based selection, and the club retreat
- Monthly financial contributor to the club

- Played for Salisbury (1988–90), Blacksburg RFC (1990–92), and Frederick RFC (1993–2005) — two national Sweet 16s and an Elite Eight appearance
- Founding forwards coach of the Virginia Tech Women's RFC (1992)
- Coached three years of youth rugby for the Lutherville-Timonium Vipers, winning three interclub championships

Greg Burkhardt '90

1985–1990

PLAYER · IN MEMORIAM

Greg earned representative honors in four consecutive years on the PRU Select Side and was named a USA Rugby Eastern Collegiate All-Star in 1988 — among the highest individual honors of any Loyola player of his era. He is inducted in memoriam.

His lasting contribution came off the field: as an inaugural SLOB board member he helped hire the head coach whose 2014 arrival launched a new era of Loyola rugby.

A four-year starter and four-time Loyola RFC MVP, Jimmy captained one of the most successful teams in recent club history — the 2016 Potomac Rugby Conference champions and 2017 Mid-Atlantic regional champions that earned a top-10 national ranking and reached the Elite Eight of the national championship tournament.

- Multiple First Team All-Conference selections
- 2016 Potomac Rugby Conference champion; 2017 Mid-Atlantic regional champion

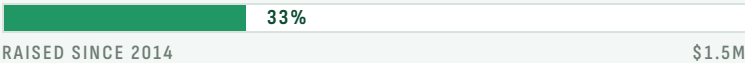
The Next Fifty Years

For its first decade the Society spent everything it raised. A dollar given was a dollar paid out that same season — scholarships, portable bleachers, a scrum sled, whatever the club needed. It kept the program alive, but it meant beginning again from nothing every year.

Project 2026 is the answer to that. The Society is building a \$1.5 million endowment whose principal is conserved rather than spent, invested under the SLOB Investment Policy Statement. At that size it would distribute roughly \$75,000 a year — enough to fund scholarships and coaching every season, in perpetuity, without ever starting over. The Board Advised Fund already runs on this model and serves as its template.
